Welcome to the University Church of St Mary the Virgin, Oxford. We are delighted that you have joined us today. This booklet will guide you through the Choral Eucharist with University Sermon for the Commemoration of Benefactors. The Revd Hannah Cartwright, Assistant Priest, is presiding and The Most Revd & Rt Hon Stephen Cottrell, Archbishop of York, will be giving the University Sermon. The Mass Setting is *The Little Organ Mass* by Joseph Haydn (1732-1809) sung by the University Church Choir under the direction of Robert Howarth. The Organist is James Brown.

UNIVERSITY SERMON

The practice of delivering University Sermons in St Mary's dates back to the earliest days of the University. Each year eminent men and women from many different traditions are invited by the Vice-Chancellor to deliver sermons 'before the University'. The University Procession includes the University Verger and Bedels, as well as the Proctors and the Vice-Chancellor (or their deputies). The University's motto from Psalm 27, *Dominus illuminatio mea* (The Lord is my light), captures something of its purpose: an occasion of focus and exploration for the illumination of the mind in the context of prayer. Today, these sermons occur here and in College Chapels across the University. They provide an opportunity to hear thinkers from a range of disciplines and perspectives, drawing together the life of learning, spiritual discovery and the quest for truth.

THE LITURGY OF THE WORD

THE FIRST READING

Acts 9.36-43

A reading from the Acts of the Apostles.

Now in Joppa there was a disciple whose name was Tabitha, which in Greek is Dorcas. She was devoted to good works and acts of charity. At that time she became ill and died. When they had washed her, they laid her in a room upstairs. Since Lydda was near Joppa, the disciples, who heard that Peter was there, sent two men to him with the request, 'Please come to us without delay.' So Peter got up and went with them; and when he arrived, they took him to the room upstairs. All the widows stood beside him, weeping and showing tunics and other clothing that Dorcas had made while she was with them. Peter put all of them outside, and then he knelt down and prayed.

He turned to the body and said, 'Tabitha, get up.' Then she opened her eyes, and seeing Peter, she sat up. He gave her his hand and helped her up. Then calling the saints and widows, he showed her to be alive. This became known throughout Joppa, and many believed in the Lord. Meanwhile he stayed in Joppa for some time with a certain Simon, a tanner.

Bringing before you the bread of life and cup of salvation, we proclaim his death and resurrection until he comes in glory.

Those seated in the south aisle and in the nave, please go to the station in front of the nave Altar and those seated on the balcony and in the north aisle please go to the station in the De Brome Chapel. Please wash your hands with the sanitiser provided. The priest will place the sacrament into your hands with the words 'the Body of Christ' to which you respond 'Amen'. You should consume the host immediately. If you wish to receive a gluten-free wafer please tell the priest at the nave Altar. If you would like a prayer of blessing, please bow your head and fold your arms as you approach the altar.
