### Craftsman's Art and Music's Measure

he arts are a catalyst for change. Most especially, the arts have the capacity to inform, shape and change our world-view, and lead us to a greater understanding of ourselves. They may bring us the necessary inspiration to effect change in our own lives, and to reimagine the ideas, narratives, and rituals around which our society gathers.

Art is, by its nature, both performative and creative; it speaks, paints, writes, sings, moulds and dances new worlds into being. It allows us to play with reality, and test out ideas and ideals before we commit to them. However, we can only truly consume the arts when we open ourselves to become, at least to some degree, consumed by our experience of them. We must immerse ourselves in a holistic experience, through which we not only observe, but also enter into and explore the thought-worlds they create. And critically, to benefit from them, we must be open to being changed and enlightened in the process. So it is with our worshipping life as Christians. In our gathered acts of worship, we immerse ourselves in artistic, song-filled, beautifully-choreographed, skilfullyhoned, improvised and imaginative, historical and hope-filled landscapes; travelling with our forebears in faith through scriptural narratives which run the whole gamut of human experience and emotion, and which teach us how God weaves the story of Salvation through our lives and throughout all time. In the Eucharist, in particular, we enact a living remembrance

of the grace we have received and, as we consume the Body of Christ together in worship, so we become consumed by its mission, and become the body of Christ (1 Corinthians 12:27) sent out into the world. As our worship spills out into our daily lives, we are invited to become co-creators with Christ; taking the vision of God's Kingdom which we have experienced, and drawing out its form in our own society.

J. L. Austin speaks of the 'performative utterance' of words which do not merely describe reality, but actually effect or change it. In his work, published posthumously, How to Do Things with Words, he explains that performative utterances (such as 'I declare this exhibit open') change reality, by speaking the intention into being. Some Christians may argue also that the words of Jesus spoken in the Eucharistic Prayer by the presiding priest: 'This is my Body' and 'This is my Blood' are an example of performative utterance, which effect a change in substantial reality too. Similarly, if we allow ourselves to be truly open to the transformative potential of the arts, their performance can also possess a quality of sacramental encounter, which helps to change lives by allowing us, not only to enter an alternate reality, but, by the power of the Spirit at work through them, to speak a greater and more life-giving reality into being in our own temporal dimension.

Our city is full of artistic opportunities. St Mary's is certainly no exception, and we have recently been introduced through our > deepening community engagement, to the work of the Old Fire Station in helping build a better reality for people in the City; especially for those who have experienced homelessness. In a cost of living crisis, we might be tempted to believe that artistic endeavour is a merely tertiary concern; only valuable to those who already have the basics to survive, and relationships to rely on. But what the Old Fire Station describe in their work is the power of the arts to unlock new meaning in life and to build relationships which can support, sustain, and help to build a better society; gathered around a vision with strong echoes of the Kingdom-vision we share. They describe their enterprise as:

'a centre for creativity in Oxford housing two organisations: the homelessness charity Crisis and Arts at the Old Fire Station (AOFS). We share our building. AOFS encourages people from all backgrounds to understand and shape the world in which we live through stories, creativity and the arts, and by connecting with others' (www.oldfirestation.org.uk)

And they speak powerfully of how the arts can present people with challenge, choice, and opportunity for new life in ways which resonate deeply with a Christian understanding of resurrection. As comment on their website observes:

'I talked to people, and they said, "Why do you need the arts?" but that's the bit that makes you a real person, and not a statistic. It's like being awakened, isn't it. It's like you've been hibernating for a really long time. And you find that you're existing. And I think what this offers, it's like waking up and it's spring.'

If you have ever felt bereft after finishing a novel or unsure of how to re-enter daily life at the end of a stirring play, concert, or film, you will recognise the power of the arts to help humans transcend the mundane, and perhaps even to grant us a fleeting window into the Divine. As we seek to be a church working in ever-closer partnership with the many communities of this City, through the arts we have an opportunity to cocreate with others for the common good, and to speak, paint, write, sing, mould and dance the New Creation into being.



### Resolved to Serve

#### From October to December 2023

uring October to December St Mary's will be hosting an exhibition 'Resolved to Serve'. Commissioned by the Diocese of Oxford, this portrait exhibition celebrates Black culture and its influence in the Church today. Beginning in Black History Month, featuring black African and Caribbean clergy in the Diocese of Oxford, Resolved to Serve tells their inspiring stories of faith and resilience. These stories are particularly poignant at this time as the UK marks the 75th anniversary year of the arrival of the Empire Windrush on our shores.

The exhibition was curated by The Reverend Polly Falconer, UKME Development Enabler in the Diocese of Oxford, (Polly spoke powerfully at a recent Sunday Forum at the University Church, on the subject of racial justice) and the Right Reverend Dr Tim Wambunya, Vicar of St Paul's Church, Slough, and Honorary Assistant Bishop for the Diocese of Oxford. The exhibition includes photography by Emma Thompson.

"Black History Month provides an opportunity to acknowledge and focus on the significant contributions people of African and Caribbean descent have made in history. By celebrating the gifts of people today we can help create a diverse church and society where all can flourish."

#### **Sunday 5 November**

#### Literacy and the 'Levelling-up' Agenda - The Revd Sorrel Shamel-Wood

The impact of the written word on the growth of Christianity cannot be understated. We are a faith indebted to the advent of the printing press and we remain continuously concerned with the interpretation and reception of our sacred texts. Yet, across the country, literacy levels vary hugely, and issues of poverty and deprivation, criminal justice, educational opportunity and literacy all interplay. The Revd Sorrel Shamel-Wood will speak to us about why literacy is central to 'levelling-up' and explore how Christians can make a difference. Sorrel is Assistant Curate in the Dorchester Ministry Team. She has an MSt in Hebrew Bible from the University of Oxford and an M.Ed in Politics, Development and Democratic Education from Cambridge. Prior to ordination in the Church of England, she was a secondary school English and Drama teacher.



#### THE GODLESS CRUSADE

Tuesday 31 October | University Church 5.00pm - 6.00pm

In this brief talk to mark the publication of The Godless Crusade, Dr Tobias Cremer will talk about religion, populism and right wing identity politics. Drawing on his extensive research in Germany, France and the USA. Tobias will explore the development



of attitudes towards Christianity in right-wing populist movements and the way in which these attitudes may be reshaping our politics internationally and nationally. This book challenges widespread assumptions and narratives about how right-wing populism and Christianity relate to one another.

Tobias Cremer holds a PhD from the University of Cambridge, an MPP from the Harvard Kennedy School, where he was a McCloy Fellow. A former Junior Research Fellow at Pembroke College, he now works in the Office of the President of Germany as an advisor on religious affairs.

#### **CANDLELIT TOURS**

St Cecilia, a third century Roman martyr, is the patron saint of music and musicians. With *Antiquum Documentum*, a local early music ensemble, you are invited to experience Vespers and Compline according to the Sarum Rite as it would have been just before the English Reformation. The pattern of the service served as Cranmer's precedent for collapsing the two service together to create Evensong in the *Book of Common Prayer 1549*. Please note that although this is a historic reconstruction, it is also an act of worship. Admission is free.

Advent is a season of outrageous promise. It is also a season when Christians explore the virtue of hope. # Sundays during University Term | Weston Library Cafe | 12noon - 1.00pm


