



CHORAL EVENSONG: THE CHURCH'S BANQUET

THE REVD CANON DR WILLIAM LAMR

Prayer the church's banquet, angel's age, God's breath in man returning to his birth, The soul in paraphrase, heart in pilgrimage, The Christian plummet sounding heav'n and earth Engine against th' Almighty, sinner's tow'r, Reversed thunder, Christ-side-piercing spear, The six-days world transposing in an hour, A kind of tune, which all things hear and fear; Softness, and peace, and joy, and love, and bliss, Exalted manna, gladness of the best, Heaven in ordinary, man well drest, The milky way, the bird of Paradise, Church-bells beyond the stars heard, the soul's blood, The land of spices; something understood.

George Herbert (1593-1633)

George Herbert, the great poet and Anglican priest of the early seventeenth century, was the parish priest in Bemerton just outside Salisbury. He would often walk to Salisbury Cathedral in the evening for Choral Evensong, which he described as his 'heaven on earth'. It is hinted at in his celebrated sonnet on Prayer, where he speaks of 'sounding heav'n and earth'.

When Archbishop Thomas Cranmer devised the service of Evening Prayer in the Book of Common Prayer, he combined the ancient monastic offices of Vespers and Compline to create a frame for prayer and reflection, which has stood the test of time. The service consists almost entirely of passages of scripture, from the versicles and responses at the beginning, to the psalms, to the readings from the Old Testament and the New Testament, to the singing of the canticles, the Magnificat (the Song of Mary) and the Nunc Dimittis (the Song of Simeon).

In the course of the summer, we will welcome many visitors to the University Church, where they will be able to attend Choral Evensong at 3.30pm on a Sunday afternoon. This elegant service provides a space and a frame as well as cues for us to discover 'the church's banquet', 'something understood'.

If you are visiting Oxford in the course of the summer months, you can be assured of a very warm welcome at the University Church. Come and find out more about the unique history of this ancient church, and look out for one of these tours over the summer.

THE DREAMING SPIRES TOUR

Book an advance ticket to enjoy after-hours access to the church tower, and view the dreaming spires of Oxford from a unique vantage point, the dreamiest spire of them all!

Dating from 1280, the tower of the University Church of St Mary the Virgin is the oldest building in Radcliffe Square. You will explore its medieval architecture, including its gargoyles and stone carvings. You will hear the chimes of the ancient bells and see the workings of the 18th century clock. You will also enjoy exclusive access to the Old Library. Built in 1320, the Old Library is the original library of the University of Oxford. In the Old Library, you will be offered a glass of fizz (non-alcoholic option available), and you will enjoy some of the finest views of the Radcliffe Camera and Radcliffe Square.

PLEASE NOTE: Access to the tower is only via a 127-step medieval turret staircase. Persons with heart conditions or pre-existing medical conditions, mobility difficulties or any condition where the effort of climbing is considered hazardous should refrain from attempting this climb. You are required to exercise due care and attention during your visit and to move around the University Church at all times with proper regard for your safety.

The session will close with the beautiful office of Compline or Night Prayer.

INDEPENDENT SAFEGUARDING: A CONVERSATION WITH THE DIOCESAN **HEAD OF SAFEGUARDING**

Sunday 7 September | Old Library 12noon - 1.00pm

The Church of England's poor record of responding to concerns about



safeguarding has been very much in the news in the course of the last twelve months. In response, the Parochial Church Council has affirmed its commitment to ensuring that safeguarding is conducted with transparency, accountability, and independence. It recognises the importance of addressing historical safeguarding failures with a survivor-centred approach, ensuring their voices shape future decisions. In this session, Dr Louise Whitehead, the Head of Safeguarding in the Diocese of Oxford, will speak about the developments which have taken place to improve safeguarding within the Diocese and outline the work which still needs to happen in order to advance safeguarding reforms nationally.

SPECIAL EVENTS

PIMMS AND PALESTRINA

Sunday 13th July | Nave | 3.30pm - 5.00pm

Join us for a special festal choral evensong, followed by a 'Pimms and Palestrina' talk given by Rob Howarth, Director of Music at the University Church, with music from the University Church Choral Scholars.

This year we are celebrating the 500th Anniversary of the birth of Palestrina, and the Choir have been singing a mixture of his lesser-known Mass settings, alongside a great number of his motets. In this talk we will explore the legacy of Palestrina's work, focussing on the work of his students, and how music ultimately moved from the Renaissance to the Baroque. Alongside his legacy we will look at how Palestrina was a master of both polyphony and homophony, and how he used music to support the text and emotion, and how that would move the passions of his congregations. We will illustrate this with a few live musical examples. There is no charge for this event but there will be the opportunity to make a donation in support of the Christian Aid Burkina Faso Project.

SECOND COFFEE Sundays | 12noon - 1.00pm Weston Library Cafe


